COLLEGE UPDATES

CORPUS CHRISTI COLLEGE K-12 FROM 2022



AMALGAMATION

On 10 December 2020 it was confirmed that the Most Reverend Timothy Costelloe, Archbishop of Perth, had endorsed the decision by Catholic Education Commission of Western Australia for the amalgamation of Corpus Christi College and Yidarra Catholic Primary School into one Kindy to Year 12 College.

The impetus for this change of operation came from the three connected communities of Corpus Christi College, St Thomas More Parish and Yidarra Catholic Primary School and was driven by the desire to bring our communities closer together.

The resoundingly positive feedback from the wider parent community, our student representations, parish representatives and the School Boards were included in the reports submitted to support the merge.

PRINCIPAL ANNOUNCED

On 22 April 2021 it was announced that Mr Jeff Allen has been appointed as Principal of our new K-12 Corpus Christi College, Bateman, commencing 1 January 2022.

Jeff brings a wealth of experience to the new Corpus Christi College community having held his current

position as Principal at Servite College, Tuart Hill, for eight years. Prior to this, Jeff was Deputy Principal at Kolbe Catholic College, Rockingham from 2006-2013, and Dean of Students at Sacred Heart College, Sorrento, from 2003-2005.

Jeff has taught within Catholic Education Western Australia for more than 30 years. In that time, he has developed his appreciation of the importance of connected school communities where individual gifts are celebrated. He is excited by the opportunity to lead the collaboration and continued community involvement in

the process of bringing Yidarra Catholic Primary School and Corpus Christi College together.

As incoming Principal Jeff has met with staff at both Yidarra Catholic Primary School (YCPS) and Corpus Christi College (CCC) and will continue to meet with the two communities throughout the year, spending additional time within both schools to learn more about each community and to connect with staff, students, and families.

As we progress towards an amalgamated College, a decision on fees and levies has already been confirmed to assist with family planning. Please note some key confirmed outcomes:

SIBLING DISCOUNTS FOR 2022 AND BEYOND

We have defined a generous new sibling discount rate for our K-12 College. From Term 1, 2022, a sibling discount of 20% will be applied to the tuition fee of a second child from the same family, 40% for a third child and 100% for fourth and subsequent siblings. These discounts will automatically be applied across the whole school from Pre-Primary to Year 12 inclusive.

SCHOOL FEES FOR 2022

While the final amounts for the various fees and charges will not be finalised and endorsed until November 2021, our aim is for the current fees to apply in 2022. The only potential change pertains to the yearly Catholic Education Western Australia system recommended increase (if applicable) which we will communicate once confirmed.

BUILDING LEVIES FOR 2022

The building levies as they currently exist at both Yidarra Catholic Primary School and Corpus Christi College will remain the same during 2022.

Families will only pay one building levy, to be paid at the rate of which their eldest child falls into:

- Kindergarten a building levy of \$300 per family will apply.
- Pre-Primary to Year 6 a building levy of \$431 per family will apply.
- Years 7 to 12 a building levy of \$1,597 per family will apply.

SCHOOL FEES AND BUILDING LEVIES BEYOND 2022

As we are committed to developing a genuine K-12 campus which supports student access to quality educational facilities across all year groups, we will confirm our fee structure, including building levies, after thorough financial modelling next year.

We look forward to being in regular communication with you as we continue to work through the key priorities to ensure clarity and confidence in the K-12 College transition.

WHAT'S ON AT CORPUS

2021 HOUSE CUP RESULTS

There were many opportunities to earn House points across the year with participation and teamwork proving to be a vital ingredient for House success. House Cup points are awarded in variety of areas including Academics, Arts, Ministry and Sports.

Term 1 started with the Quest Retreat and the Canned Food Drive where MacKillop provided the largest collection. Next, the first Inter-house Swimming Carnivals were held in the new College Aquatic Centre, where De Vialar swam their way to first place. Pallotti impressed with a surprise win at the Cross Country Carnival. For the Project Compassion fundraiser 'Line of Hope', Merici netted a win for the longest line, with De Vialar securing victory for the most funds raised.

House points are awarded for the top academic performance in Middle School and Senior School at the end of each semester. The House Cup points tally starts at the beginning of Term 4 each year. In the Academic stakes, the top performing House in Middle School for Semester 2 2020 was Romero and for Semester 1 2021, Salvado was best. In Senior School, Merici was the top performer in Semester 2 2020, with De Vialar taking first place in Semester 1 2021.

Salvado took victory in the annual Corpus Christi Day Talent Quest held in Term Two. Term Three was packed with activities, starting with the Inter-house Play where students did an outstanding job at performing various aspects of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream', with Xavier's performance acknowledged as the finest. Xavier also won the Inter-house Athletics Carnival in August and Pallotti scored first place in the creative LifeLink challenge.

The final totals were very close with De Vialar triumphant on 69 points – one point ahead of fast finishing Salvado. Congratulations to De Vialar, winner of the 2021 House Cup!

VISUAL ARTS WHEATBELT TOUR

During the July school holidays, 18 of our Senior School Arts students embarked on the 2021 Visual Art Wheatbelt Tour with Head of Arts Julie Pannell and Visual Arts Technician Trevor Bly.

The 6-day tour was centred around the state's biggest mural project: the large-scale FORM public mural art silo trail. The roundtrip showcased the West Australian narrative and gave students an opportunity to develop a body of work in response to the striking scenery – 'outcomes-based making' in site-specific locations.

Locations visited included: Northam, Merredin, Hyden, Newdegate, Lake Grace, Pingrup, Katanning, Collie and Bunbury.

In addition to touring various public art highlights, students immersed themselves in local country communities and a vast array of regional attractions, such as Wave Rock and Mulga Caves. Indigenous culture and art were also explored. The experiences were a boost for visual inspiration, helping students generate

innovative ideas and form bases for research. Students also learnt about the importance of regional tourism and celebrating our state's identity.

Students built on their skills in materials and techniques through hands-on experiences at regional centres, including:

- Multiple En Plein Air (Open Air) drawing workshops at tourist and scenic landscapes
- Bunbury Regional Art Gallery tour and skill building workshop

The artwork, tests and sketches produced over the week were the equivalent to an additional month of art classes during the school term. Students went on to create works for their art portfolios for submission towards ATAR, General Art Folio, and Certificate Folio Drawing Component.

The College congratulates all involved on a highly successful tour.












PEOPLE OF CORPUS - STAFF

CLASS OF 2011

Graduating from Corpus in 2011, Nicola went straight to Murdoch University, pursuing a Bachelor of Arts, majoring in Public Relations, Tourism and Events.

But like many young people in that phase of life, she was unsure of what she wanted to do or which career path to take.

"All I knew was that I wanted a corporate job which involved lots of events and travel - I've actually been lucky enough to get that.

"But there I was, in my final year of university, graduating in a few months and thinking I should probably get an internship before leaving."

Some time later, an opportunity came up with the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES), to work in their Media and Corporate Communications team which she jumped at.

"Six years later I'm still here and in a job that I absolutely love!" she says.

Her efforts in her current role at DFES as Marine Services Officer have not gone unnoticed either, recently seeing her awarded the 2021 DFES Corporate Award for Outstanding Individual Contribution.

This significant award was for her work in developing and implementing the new Marine Rescue WA brand across the State and supervising and mentoring three Public Sector Commission Indigenous trainees.

The project involved implementing a State wide re-brand of 37 Marine Rescue groups, standardising vessel livery for over 73 vessels, as well as building signage, business stationary, email addresses, radio callsigns and volunteer uniforms.



"I was 24 at the time and walked into a mammoth project, but after meeting the volunteers and seeing their enthusiasm for the project, it gave me the motivation to do everything I could to make sure they got exactly what they needed," she said.

Driving the branding project, Nicola also supervised three trainees, both guiding them on working in a corporate environment as well as through any personal issues they were dealing with.

"Seeing them grow from start to finish was so rewarding and two of them are still at DFES, absolutely excelling in their careers and I couldn't be prouder of them," Nicola said.

On her work, Nicola says she has been provided with experiences she would've have never imagined possible during her years at Corpus. "I'm extremely thankful for everything my role has given me. From travelling across WA and the Indian Ocean Territories, visiting some of the most remote places all the way from Esperance to Kununurra," she said.

"I've snorkelled with sharks in Cocos Keeling Islands, spotted crocs in Kununurra and caught giant mud crabs in Derby."

She explained that the experiences made available to her are only possible because of the 1800+ Marine Rescue volunteers across the State who give up their time to help the community.

"Working with these volunteers is genuinely inspiring, they're out on the water in the early hours of the morning helping a fisherman who has broken down, or searching at night in horrific weather looking for someone's Dad, brother or friend who never came home.

"What I do in comparison to these people is nothing and it's really inspiring being able to help them and promote the amazing work they do," she said.

On her years at Corpus, Nicola says it was the teachers rather than the subjects that made a lasting impression.

"Having teachers that support you and allow you to grow as a young adult was key, people like Miss Cattapan and Mr Guard played a big role in my high school experience.

"The person who made the biggest impression on me though, was the careers advisor at the time, Mrs Middleton," she said.

"She was the one who put me into a traineeship and was the reason I got into university and am where I am today. People like that are so important to a young person's growth and are invaluable to the Corpus Community."

Nicola hopes to keep taking each experience as it comes and continue enjoying her job and offered some words of advice to current students.

"Happiness is worth way more than money and if you can find something that brings you both, make sure to hold onto it.

"I'd encourage students not to burden themselves stressing about finding a 'path' or a 'passion', just enjoy your high school experience because everything will fall into place afterwards," she said.

"For me everything started to fall into place at University. For you that might be TAFE or taking a break to decide what you want to do. Just breathe, it's all going to be fine!"



WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

CLARENCE GOHCLASS OF 2009

One of the mentors of the 2021 Corpus Christi College Mentor Program, Clarence is no stranger to many around the College.

Graduating from Corpus in 2009, the following years saw him pursue a double degree in Engineering (specialising in Mining Engineering) and Commerce (Majoring in Human Resource Management) at the University of Western Australia.

After graduating from UWA with First Class Honours, he began working at the Boddington Bauxite Mine for South32, where he stayed for almost seven years in a variety of roles which included drill and blast design engineering and coordination, drill prep supervision and weekly mine scheduling.

This past year has been an eventful one for Clarence, moving companies to begin working FIFO for BHP as a Weekly Mine Scheduling Engineer at their South Flank Iron Ore Mine.

So what does he do in his role as Weekly Scheduler?

"Essentially, I plan what the operation teams are doing for the week on the mine site," Clarence explained.

"All the trucks, excavators, drill rigs and blast crew are assigned jobs based on what I plan for the week. It is a very fast paced role that presents many challenges, but one which is rewarding.

"I've been very fortunate in my career and love the role and the industry I'm in, because of the opportunities within the mining industry.

"Each day as a Weekly Planner, new challenges are brought to my desk and my job is the ensure each stakeholder is collaborated with so the plan I send out is the most efficient and maximises value.

Speaking about his school years, Clarence says the subjects he studied may not necessarily relate to the work he does now on a daily basis but laid the foundation for his future.

"I took the top two math subjects which were Calculus and Applicable Math, as well as Physics, Chemistry and English 3A/3B.

"Do I use physics and chemistry daily in my work? No. However, in my role, there are times I'd need to recall what I learnt.



"Those subjects gave me the fundamentals that transitioned through to university and I think that is where its value lies," he said.

Youth ministry is another passion of his since graduating from Corpus, volunteering at St Thomas More Bateman Parish and Catholic Youth Ministry Perth, which has also seen him MC the Australian Catholic Youth Festival for some 5000 youth.

"I didn't have mentors when I was growing up but remember key people in my life who nurtured me to shape me into the person I am today.

"I'm so thankful for all the life lessons and have always wanted to give back to the community in which I grew up," he explained.

Youth ministry has provided him with that opportunity, which he cherishes dearly.

"Ministering to the young people and seeing them grow as young men and women, learning about Christ and their Catholic faith – then themselves stepping up to be youth ministers - that for me is fulfilling," he said. Part of Clarence's journey as a Catholic has also seen him recently invested as a Knight with the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem, an ancient Order with the task of providing support to the Christian presence in the Holy Land, contributing to the preservation of churches, hospitals, dispensaries, laboratories and social centres.

In his spare time, he is also a black belt in Karate, coaching others at his Dojo in Coogee, and travelled to Japan in 2019 to attend the World ShitoRyu Karate Championships.

Clarence says to take each experience, whether positive or negative, in one's stride and use it to grow as an individual.

"Difficulties and struggles may come throughout life, but each experience gives you a new opportunity to learn and grow.

"No matter how difficult, far or how scary things may seem, take a leap of faith," he concluded.
